INTRODUCTION

As we currently navigate through these highly charged political times, this book addresses the history and the experiences of an immigrant family. This book accounts a family history that isn't entirely mine but could represent a shared past, full of sacrifices but involving accomplishments too. The story of my family took place during one of the last waves of the European migration to America. This book starts in the country where it all began for us: the North African land of Libya, which was once a thriving Italian colony.

Apart from the vast history of Italy, it is interesting to remember that Libya benefited from the introduction of both the modern European irrigation systems and home-building techniques. From 1910 to 1946, colonial Italy worked hard to bring Libya out of the "middle ages" and imprinted some of its cultures on the various Arab nations. My family members, all Italian citizens, unfortunately, migrated back to Italy, our homeland, in the late 1950s as Libya started to show signs of internal monarchy government deterioration and financial uncertainties. Living in Italy in the 1960s, we experienced part of the country's many financial instabilities and trying times. During those years, many groups of skilled Italians seized the risks, looking for more opportunities, and immigrated to their final destination: The United States of America. Reading this book, Americans can re-experience the 1960s and 1970s and rejoice that once upon a time, America implemented Immigration Laws to benefit American growth and security.

This book recounts not only my personal history but also that of my family meeting the requirements and rules of the American immigration system of the 1960s era. Thus, this work analyzes how the "merit system" worked then - and should still work today - representing, in my opinion, the only correct approach to enriching our country with immigrants that bring skills, hard work, and vision. The history of mine is not for the fainthearted: it carried joy and sorrow as we fought to establish our identity and history. The challenges also established the concepts and guidelines for our early successes and, unfortunately, also some disappointments too. Coming from far and exotic places where only a few thrived and endured in spite of everything, my family blossomed and prospered, especially when we got to America. With each experience, though, the body, the mind, and the character become a gateway to challenge the future with each of the previously obtained lessons.

The second part, titled "Out of Italy," highlights our family's early accomplishments and proficiencies that catapulted us to where we are and live today. It takes place in 1960s Italy, a time of new discoveries and peace

but one that demands hard work. It shaped the skin and principles of the family and our early contributions guided by an entrenched work ethic. It explains how respect, hard work, and education go hand in hand to achieve one's goals. As Italians with a rich millennial history, we struggled with the system and government of those ages. By the early 1960s, World War II was over for the Italian population. However, it still carried with it a heavy burden of reconstruction for all European citizens.

Ingenuity carried Italians through time, even before Christ engraved our genetic heritage. The great minds who lived in all the different countries of Europe have contributed their culture, art, intellect, and working principles to create the great "melting pot" represented by the United States of America.

The last part of the book I call "Coming to America" covers almost half of this book's content.
